11 winners receive Greater Baltimore Committee's 2008 'Bridging the Gap' minority business awards

Six Baltimore-area companies, two nonprofits, a majority-minority partnership, and two individuals were named winners of the Greater Baltimore Committee's 2008 Bridging the Gap Awards.

The awards were presented on Oct. 8 during ceremonies honoring minority-owned and women-owned firms for achievement and others for their efforts to strengthen minority business development. The awards event was held at the Reginald F. Lewis Museum of Maryland African American History and Culture.

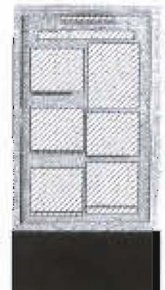
Winners for outstanding business achievement ranged from minority-owned information technology firms to a small, woman-owned heavy construction business. Winners also included a major health system, a prominent bank, and a partnership between a national majority-owned development company and a local group of minority-owned developers and builders.
